Chair's Report

Reflecting on the last few months things have been relatively quiet, but we are still suffering from antisocial behaviour both in Charing and Charing Heath and I suspect that during the summer break there may well have been more instances of mindless and thoughtless incidents. We will try to identify the culprits and pass the information onto our community police contact.

Charing village has seen a constant number of vehicles turning right out of Station Road daily, not just cars but trucks as well and we are actively seeking an alternative with KCC to the traffic signs which are constantly being ignored. The implementation of the building process for the new developments in Charing are still being held up by the "Stodmarsh Issues" and Natural England's criteria for mitigation of run off contamination to the Stour, ABC are actively looking for solutions for themselves with active input from developers.

Charing Heath has had its own issues with antisocial behaviour on the football field with graffiti being sprayed over the changing rooms again. Also there have been breaches of planning conditions for three sites within Charing Heath and one outright refusal. The PC is waiting to see whether ABC follows up on these sites with firm actions.

ABC have just started a review of the Borough Plan that will commence the period from 2030-2040 and as a result have a call for sites which will be reviewed over the coming months to see which may be suitable for increasing the housing stock going forward into the next decade. Sadly, the Save Our Heathlands community group have had to withdraw from challenging Maidstone Borough Council over the plan for 5000 houses through lack of funds to fight their case.

Some good news - Charing will find out if we have won an award in The Village in Bloom competition which will be announced on the 20th of September and I would like to thank Dawne, Jo and the gardening society for their input.

Finally, the Parish Council will hold its first meeting in Charing Heath and Lenham Heath village hall on the 10th of September @ 7.30 pm. If you have anything you wish to discuss with The PC there will be ample opportunity to do so.

Finance Report

We are pleased to report that the CCTV system is up and running, we hope that the cost will bear fruit and help reduce the near £1000 per month that vandalism and anti social behaviour costs the Parish Council.

The new government are determined to build the houses they say are required to meet the countries housing needs, Ashford have had their target for development reduced, but the target still remains, we are prepared for the fight and will do all we can to maintain the Parish as a beautiful and pleasant place to live.

There are fears that cut backs from central government to borough council funding will mean services being withdrawn and we will look to maintain the services that are required to keep Charing Parish as we know it, there may be the case that the Parish Council has to step in and fund the services locally. We hope to have more details after the Autumn Statement has been delivered and ABC have considered the outcomes.

Our open spaces (Clewards Meadow, picnic area next to A20, Piquets play area and adjacent green space, Charing Heath recreation ground, Westwell Leacon recreation ground) are wonderful assets for the village. Please can we ask all dog walkers to:

Communications

Over the course of 2024 we have resumed work on communications to try to ensure that the Parish Council connects more effectively with you – the people who live in the village. This isn't as easy as it sounds since our village community is made up of very different people, with very different expectations. For some, communication is about technology, whilst for others it is a matter of receiving printed newsletters. And many people have a preference for hearing the latest news word of mouth.

So, whilst trying to be cost-effective, we are also trying to reach out to meet the expectations of all of our residents – the young, the old and the in-between, those who have lived in Charing for many years and those who have only just arrived, those who are in the centre of the village and those in other parts – for example in Charing Heath and Westwell Leacon.

Our website provides the key information you have a right to expect from us. It tells you who the Parish Councillors are, and it will provide information on Parish Council meetings too. We have included other local information – about local businesses, about the school, about Charing surgery and so on, to provide a resource that's available if you have a question about what is going on in the village or who to contact.

Inevitably, we have debated the merits of setting up a new website, perhaps to give a more current look and feel to the information. However, websites cost money and we have no wish to spend unnecessarily. We have decided, for the moment at least, that we should stay with our existing format, seeking to streamline it and to ensure it is up-to-date.

Our second commitment is to continue the production of a regular newsletter, and we aim to get this out to everyone in the village. Where possible, we deliver the Charing Parish Council Newsletter by hand (it gives Parish Councillors some exercise!) to save costs. However, parts of the Parish are rural – even isolated – and so we post the Newsletters where we have to. And of course, the Newsletter is also available on our website too. If anyone would like to help with the delivery please contact cpclerk@charingkent.org.

Finally, we are trying to improve on face-to-face communication. Members of the public are always free to attend Parish Council meetings, held on the first Tuesday of the month in the room above the Charing Parish Hall. In addition, we have held Councillor surgeries both in Charing village and in Charing Heath and will hold a full council meeting in Charing Heath in the autumn.

We try, as a Council, to be available to residents and to communicate with all 2,500+ residents in a way that they find most helpful. If you have suggestions or comments, please do let us know.

Charing Station

Charing Parish Council is a station 'adopter' at Charing, our local station. This means we are trying to improve the environment there. Those of you who use the London-bound platform may have noticed recently that a gate has been put in to allow access to the unused, Network Rail land behind. The wonderful staff at Heath Farm School, also a station adopter, are planning to turn this land into an outdoor learning space and community garden for children at the school. This is a community project and currently the land is overgrown with various saplings and hog weed which needs to be cleared before this plan can go ahead.

Network Rail have asked if there is anyone who can use power tools who would be willing to help support the clearance activity. The timescale is likely to be 1 day's activity sometime

between October and February to avoid the nesting season, however the earlier the better. The area is about 5 metres by 15 metres.

Highways

Our Highways projects are proceeding slowly as always – but there is some progress.

If you drive down Pluckley Road you are bound to spot the notices asking people to check their speed. Speeding is a problem in Pluckley Road with surveys confirming that many people drive noticeably faster than the 30mph limit. We felt that much speeding was inadvertent, particularly in the part of the road which is straight

and, relative to other roads in the village, comparatively wide.



These are informal signs so have to be placed on private land – e.g. attached to someone's fence. Residents were enthusiastic; a number were happy to display them and a number were generous enough to donate towards the cost. The Parish Council thanks them for their generosity. It is thought that they have made some difference to the speed of traffic but we will need to take a survey in due course to check this.

The plan to extend the 40mph limit on Faversham Road has now passed its legal stage (the Traffic Regulation Order). The next stage is the detailed design – for example exactly where the main signs and the "repeater" signs should go – and after that it should actually happen.

We have agreed with KCC Highways the plan for "gates" on the A20 coming from Ashford, the A252 just before the Faversham Road junction and, if possible, a

small gate on Pluckley Road. This is now also about to enter the detailed design stage.

In March this year planning permission was granted to Quinn estates to convert the old pumping station behind Harrison Court and build three more houses. The plans incorporate a pavement on the opposite side of the road (where there is a wide enough verge) up to the WOW factory. This will make it easier for residents in both the new houses and in Harrison Court and the other houses to walk towards the station and the village without having to walk on the road itself. The pavement has to be completed before the first of the new houses is occupied.

The Traffic Regulation Order to provide legal force to zig zag lines outside a number of schools in the borough, including Charing, should shortly be underway. The delay was checking which schools needed this.

We have yet to hear anything about the review of the A20/Station Road/High Street crossroads which was due to happen a few months ago. We keep asking.

Charing Library

Discover Charing Library's new wildlife courtyard haven

This month, the dedicated team at Charing Library rolled up their sleeves and transformed the library's courtyard into a vibrant wildlife garden. This initiative, led by Alison, Matt, Paramita, and Sharon, with additional help from Christine, Paul, Sarah, and Shirley, marks a significant step towards creating a beautiful space that can be enjoyed from within the library, while also supporting local wildlife.

The project began with a thorough clean-up of the courtyard. Leaves were cleared, weeds were cut back, and an overgrown thorn bush was finally tamed after much effort. The team then planted a variety of wildflower

seeds and flowers, donated by Charing Parish Council and Sharon, to attract local wildlife.

In addition to the beautiful flowers, the team also created various wildlife shelters using pots and dead wood found during the clean-up. These shelters provide a safe haven for insects and small animals, encouraging biodiversity in the area. Young people from across Kent contributed by creating and donating bird boxes and bug hotels, adding a personal touch to the garden.



Charing Arts - Charing's newest society

Charing Arts was created in May this year to give more profile to the arts – including music – in the village. Early ventures included art classes, a trip to Dulwich Picture Gallery and the organisation of Charing's Art Festival at the end of August. At the time of writing, the Festival is about to take place but once it is over we will have other exciting ventures under way.

Art Classes

The art classes, held in the early summer, proved enormously popular and will continue in the autumn, taking inspiration from the beautiful village of Charing. The classes will celebrate village landmarks using different artistic media including inks, chalks, pastels, charcoal and watercolour pencils. The cost of the classes includes materials and is £12.50 a lesson for non-members - £50 for a block of four. For members of Charing Arts the fees will be £10.50 per lesson or £42 for the block of four. Dates are: September 16th, September 23rd, September 30th and October 7th.
