Chair's Report

The CPC wish you all a belated happy and healthy new year.

Writing this newsletter in early January and looking back on the last newsletter some things have changed with the current government implementing house building targets across the UK. One of these being the threat to override any planning decisions that end up going to appeal that they consider the wrong planning decision has been taken. We will have to wait and see what transpires over the coming months and to see what effect it has on the parish of Charing.

ABC's new proposals for the 2030 review of the boroughs plan are now taking place with PC having to comment on the latest suggestions for the next phase of house building and industrial sites being identified within the parish by ABC, these at present are consultative ideas which we have already replied in depth to the suggested sites, more information will follow when it becomes available.

As reported in the last newsletter development throughout the parish is mainly on hold but some minor sites (less than 10 units) have submitted plans that mitigate the potential contaminated run off into the Stour and have been given permission to start but larger developments are still awaiting a definitive solution.

The council held its first meeting in the Charing Heath and Lenham Heath village hall but only three parishioners attended, one from Charing and two observers from Charing Heath. The meeting was held at the village hall to satisfy recent calls that we were not communicating with the whole parish it was therefore an eye opener that the residents who complained didn't turn up. At present we no longer have a desire to do so again unless there is significant support within Charing Heath.

Also, the latest news from government about combining all boroughs under the auspices of one central authority with a mayor in situ with overall control of the planning system is a cause for concern. We are waiting for the report from KCC on the meeting taking place this week (10/11 January) on their take on the situation.

Once again, all the councillors and our staff have worked really hard during 2024 and I thank them all for their dedication.

Finance Report

The Finance Committee have been busy as usual finalising budgets for the various committees of the Parish Council and we have agreed a budget for the next financial year, this will result in a precept increase of 12.5%, this is mainly due to the continual price increases we see from our suppliers, driven by the budget requirements to increase NI contributions and the National Minimum Wage, and removal of County Council funding for our Community Warden.

It was decided by full council to try and keep the Community Warden in place as they do such vital work for our residents, KCC have offered the possibility of groups of villages to club together and finance a warden directly, we have been in touch with other councils, locally, and hope to secure a warden for one day a week, this will require a contribution of £10,000 pa but it was deemed a reasonable sum for the benefit delivered.

We have managed to keep our reserves at the required levels during the past year but there is the potential that they will need to be increased when the devolution plans are implemented, this will have an impact on the precept, so we have added some of this increase into this year's precept to reduce the increase next year.

I understand that increases are not what you are wanting to hear in these tough times, but we have done all we can to keep any increase to the minimum, we still strive to find ways to generate more outside income for the Parish Council without putting us in any financial jeopardy.

May myself and the Finance Committee wish you all a Happy New Year

Charing Station: 200 Years of Passenger Transport

As explained in our last issue, the Parish Council is a station 'adopter' at Charing, our local station – trying to make things better for everyone who uses the station. If you use the London bound platform, you will have noticed some significant changes as the scrub land immediately behind the platform has been cleared. This is a work in progress as staff at Heath Farm School, (also a station adopter), are turning this into an outdoor learning space and community garden for children at the school.

Firstly, a big 'thank you' to those of you who kindly volunteered to help with the clearance process. We were overwhelmed by the support offered. And Network Rail were so overwhelmed that they (unexpectedly) did the work themselves! So now we are looking at a patch of land that has been cleared and we can see the beginnings of a pathway through it. Watch this space for further developments.

On the Ashford-bound platform we continue to benefit from the great support from students and staff at Ashford College. You may have noticed that the 'CHARING' stones next to the carpark have been cleared and cleaned. Thank you to the students who helped us with this project. The Parish Council have also funded some of the plants that survive at the station – again with planting support from the College students (despite the weather and, unfortunately, some vandalism).

And finally, the year 2025 brings with it the celebration of 200 years of rail passenger transport, marking the launch of the Stockton-Darlington railway This will be highlighted through Railway 200 a year-long nationwide partnership-led campaign to celebrate 200 years of the modern railway. Our station is a lifeline for commuters and visitors to our village – and keeps us part of a network of sustainable transport across the country.

Charing Library

Discover Charing Library's new wildlife courtyard haven. Last August, the dedicated team at Charing Library rolled up their sleeves and transformed the library's courtyard into a vibrant wildlife garden. This initiative, led by Alison, Matt, Paramita, and Sharon, with additional help from Christine, Paul, Sarah, and Shirley, marks a significant step towards creating a beautiful space that can be enjoyed from within the library, while also supporting local wildlife.

The project began with a thorough clean-up of the courtyard. Leaves were cleared, weeds were cut back, and an overgrown thorn bush was finally tamed after much effort. The team then planted a variety of wildflower seeds and flowers, donated by Charing Parish Council and Sharon, to attract local wildlife.

In addition to the beautiful flowers, the team also created various wildlife shelters using pots and dead wood found during the clean-up. These shelters provide a safe haven for insects and small animals, encouraging biodiversity in the area. Young people from across Kent contributed by creating and donating bird boxes and bug hotels, adding a personal touch to the garden. While the garden is not accessible to the general public, it can be admired from inside the library. This ensures that visitors can enjoy the beauty of the garden and observe the wildlife it attracts, all from the comfort of the library.



<u>Highways</u>

Slow progress continues with the various Highways projects. No more to report on the extension of the 40mph speed limit on Faversham Road where we await the detailed design for where the signs, including the "repeater" signs that need to be placed every so often along the stretch, have to go. However, we have received the detailed design for some "gates" at the entrances to Charing along with a quote for the costs which the Parish Council has accepted. So these should be installed during the next few months.

The point of the "gates" (which can be seen on approaches to a number of villages in Kent) is to make drivers more aware that they are about to drive through a village and should therefore adapt their speed appropriately. These new gates will also have the "village nameplate" on them to help make them more prominent. The current "nameplates" as you approach Charing, which are often not in suitable places, will be removed. This should help to create more prominent entrances to the village for drivers.



There will be two gates for the moment. One will be on the A252 as you approach the junction with Faversham road. It will be opposite the pedestrian refuge thus giving drivers the impression of the road narrowing. The second will be on the A20 as you approach from Ashford and will be where the 40 mph limit starts.

Unfortunately there was no suitable place for gates on Pluckley Road but new 30 limit signs, on both sides of the road, will have "Welcome to CHARING, please drive carefully" which should make them a little more prominent.

So there is progress on the gates and our contact at KCC for these improvements is both pleasant and efficient. But we feel we are being kept largely in the dark about the review of the A20/Station Road/High Street cross-roads. A proposed plan for new signage – which we did not think adequate – did make its way to us in the Autumn (via our contact for improvements). Comments were fed back but we have no knowledge of whether any notice has been taken of them or not. That the people responsible for the review will not talk to us directly is frustrating and a contrast to what happened in the past.

For new readers - My name is Peter New I am a Police Volunteer with Kent Police and work in Community Neighbourhood Watch across the whole Ashford District. My Force number is 91725.

I will be producing a NHW Plan to deliver my NHW work across the whole District. It will be a clearly written plan of how I will work and my priorities of the risks for areas.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH MEMBERSHIP and how we grow it. If you haven't joined it please do its completely free. I will communicate by communications across your local Facebook Groups. I will contribute to any newsletters that cover the area, like this excellent publication. If I can attend community events in the area I will.

If I have your address and email, I can target an alert or appeal direct to your home. I DO NOT BOMBARD YOU! If you get too many emails you will stop reading and miss the vital message. Read my general alerts on Facebook but if I write to you its nearby.

To encourage you all to build smaller communication groups in your roads maybe for example WHATS APP GROUPS. Or just be a good neighbour to someone nearby.

TO JOIN NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH. There is nothing to do or pay, just read any email I send out if there is any crime nearby. Everything is free you just read and stay safe. I was ex fire service for 34 years so REMEMBER EVERYTHING I DO IS ABOUT PREVENTION. If you join don't forget to tell your insurance company you are now in Neighbourhood Watch, most offer a small discount on premiums.

CRIME TRENDS IN 2025. The main areas to be aware of are in fact they split into two very distinct groups:

GROUP ONE SCAMS- Cybercrimes, Scams, Rogue Traders, Bogus callers. Never ever agree to unsolicited work on your doorstep. It occurs in your area! Sadly, there is a scam for everything and anything. TAKE YOUR TIME if in doubt please do nothing.

GROUP TWO - all other crimes from "chancer and opportunist" through to drugs. However never forget that so much other crime is driven by drugs as users need to steal to fund purchases.

Leave nothing on show in a parked car, vans carrying tools and equipment are especially a risk. Other risk areas are Sheds, Garages, Barns, Stables, Outbuildings and any form of External Storage.

Thankfully Burglaries are extremely low in Kent.

Reporting all incidents is essential to allow crime prevention to be given priority.

I would like to give special mention to a matter that has started to cause concerns in rural areas: Drug dealing and delivery/distribution of drugs in areas like rural village car parks.

Those areas are used as the chances of a passing police patrol car are much less than a town area. Passing footfall of people is low especially late at night so again the drug people are not seen. The dealers who bring drugs into an area can be violent people and we do not want that level of crime brought into an area. We don't want drug users travelling into our rural villages to purchase the drugs, they may see an opportunity to commit crime whilst in the area.

Finally, we don't want out young people encountering people and products that will harm their health.

If you think you see these types of events happening call the police immediately on 999.

Please be alert and vigilant to this type of crime and any information especially descriptions of vehicles would be very helpful, BUT NO RISKS PLEASE.

So finally stay safe, secure, alert and vigilant.
